RATES OF POSTAGE.

ALL LETTERS MUST BE PREPAID.

LETTERS $\frac{1}{2}$ ounce in weight to any part of the United States, within 3000 miles 3 cents, over 3000 miles 10 cents.

Letters dropped for delivery from the same office 1 cent.

Advertised Letters 1 cent.

Penny Post delivery to and from the Post Office, 1 or 2 cents.

Letters to or from California and Oregon 10 cents.

To Canada, New Brunswick, Cape Breton, Prince Edwards Island, Nova Scotia, and Newfoundland, 10 cents, when not over 3000 miles; 15 cents, if more than that distance from the line — may be prepaid or not.

Letters to Cuba, British West Indies, Chagres, Panama, Mexico, and other Foreign Places where the rates are not fixed by treaty, 10 cents, when the distance does not exceed 2500 miles — 20 cents for any greater distance. *Postage must be prepaid.*

To Great Britain and Ireland 24 cents; if from or to California or Oregon, 29 cents. Prepayment optional.

To Norway, Sweden, Denmark, Russia, Austria, Prussia, France, Italy, Turkey, Greece, Sicily, Switzerland, and the German States, 21 cents, *prepaid.*

To Spain, via Southampton 73 cents, via France 41 cents, *prepaid.*

Portugal 63 cents, *prepaid.*

To Hong Kong, 21 cents; China 43 cents, *prepaid.*

East Indies, 45 cents, *prepaid.*

Letters weighing more than $\frac{1}{2}$ ounce will be charged *double* the above rates, and if weighing more than 1 ounce three times, &c

Valuable letters will be registered at the office of mailing on the application of the person posting the same, and the payment of a registration fee of 5 cents.

NEWSPAPERS, periodicals, unsealed circulars, or other articles of printed matter (except books), when sent to any part of the United States, and weighing not over 3 oz. 1 cent, and for every additional oz or part thereof, 2 cents. If within the State, and not weighing over $1\frac{1}{2}$ ounce, $\frac{1}{2}$ cent. BOOKS, bound or unbound, not weighing over 4 lbs, for any distance under 3000 miles, 1 cent per ounce; over 3000, 2 cents per oz. The above must be prepaid, or double these rates.
