Nov 20 - 1842

Dear Sir. -

I appeared, according to

previous arrangement, for you on
Saturday last, at Lewis Barbours's Bar,
on the action brought by Blair & Stonewall.
I expect he thought to catch you napping and
absent you; he therefore appeared without being
prepared for trial; and consequently desired
an adjournment which was granted. The trial
was accordingly postponed for three weeks.

You had better come down and attend to
it (the trial) if you can. If you do not ^{appear} however,
I shall stand to ~~it~~ it, if it and health permitting.

Your witness, Mr. Walt, is at present very
ill, I trust however, that he will be able to ap-
pear at the forthcoming day of trial. I think
it is necessary to procure one or more witnesses
more who can testify that they have seen
your Neighbour's cattle on the premises of
the Plaintiff coming ranges to the farm
Plaintiff's coop. You had better attend
to this business if you can. If you can
not however I shall not neglect your interest.

If you do not come down, but have an op-
portunity to send I shall be happy to attend
to any business you may see proper to
give Absent down.
