be a good measure if it was not a wig meser  
I have talk with your father to try at prosude  
him out of his good old way but I can not  
but he is well and all the family Mary is  
to be married soon to Mr Mattoes I left boston  
last week saw Nansy and soes all well

is for himself and left home our crops are  
all good except potatoes which are scarce  
they are worth five sellings at Camden  
your aunt Betsy young has married Luis O'gear  
at Camden one twenty four the other eighty four  
Moses young is bidding a house said to cost  
two thousand dollars your uncle James lives  
near Isaac Richards formerly did Abial Steal  
has bought your uncle Gedions farm and moved  
many other farms have changed hands since  
you left town last evening we had the first  
snow this season to day it rains hard I work  
at my old trade burning lime please to write  
to me how the crops is with you and how business  
is with you please to write to me the first  
opportunity I expect you would have to me long before
