Lincolnville July the 27, 1849

Dear Children

It is a long time since we heard from you, I expect you begin to think we have all forgotten you, but not so - we often think of you! and should be glad to see you all, I want you to write as soon as you get this, - and let us know if you are sick or well, and I want to know if I can have a hope of ever seeing you again in this life, - your Pa and I do not enjoy very good health this summer, - I made Farnham a visit about three weeks since - he, and wife, little son and daughter were all well, - Farnham said he should write you soon, Richard and ^{Mary} are well now, - Mary does not enjoy very good health, - Nancy is well and works to Mrs. Halls, but where is dear Lois? alas! she is in yonder grave yard - we never shall see her dear face, nor hear her dear voice again, - she was mild and lovely and beautiful, - she was a blessing here below, a loving kind and faithful child, - Nancy thought much of her death, and for many days would not be comforted, it is a great affliction to us all, but we must try to bear it patiently, - we got a letter from Joel and Phebe last Friday, they were both well, they want you to write them, they live in hallowell Vanhooken - Ruth, Darius, Gliddah, and Senances are all well,

In your last letter you said you thought you should sell and go to the Illinois or Wisconsin, why not come to Lincolnville or Hallowell, I think you would do well here, every thing is cheap and plenty one cord of bark will almost pay for a barrel of flour, corn molasses, tea and sugar are cheap calicoes and sheetings are from seven cents to ninepence, per yard
