I should be glad to hear from you often, please write me soon — direct all to Cassden, It has been very cold and dry all this season so far. untill three days since we had one night rain, corn in the ground 4 weeks could not sprout it has been so dry in hundreds of places the earth had become so dry that it had been blown off and the seed left almost bare, acres of grain left as bare as if it had never been harrowed, a great many sick in this section, Charles Wadsworth carries his wife to day — has been sick a long while
