In reply to yours of 6<sup>th</sup> inst  
concerning Mr. S. I have to say that Mrs. Richards  
has legal authority to give possession of his land,  
by the process of foreclosure and auction,  
the whole thing may be done up in ten  
days to a certainty. It is desirable to draw  
two game out to see if I cannot see whether  
Richard's land is worth anything. At all  
events it should be sold if it is worth the land better  
than it is worth for the mill.

Mrs. Richards. I have just before a copy  
of Mr. Bates's letter to you that you advise  
me to write you at Fair Haven. I can  
write therefore consider this answer and advise  
to you as it relates entirely to your business.

If you think it is worth your  
trouble before make one in form.  
It will be necessary that you appear personally  
before a Justice of the Peace and make complaint for  
which purpose you had probably better
