Dear Sir,

When I was at your place I had the impression that Smith was to make an entry of some goods. Should you find any difficulty in adding the duties send me the articles, quantity & value and I will send you the rate of duty. He must not pay his duties to Stevens as he is not an officer in this district.

If there are any other cases in your town or below you when men are bringing in goods on which there are duties let me know. I said to Hammond & Smith that I
