Messrs Wheelwright & Clark
refused to forward a bill of my goods, selected by
Mr Amisway at Bangor. I understand in Quincy
to say, that at the time he selected the goods, they
accepted draft on you - but subsequently they
refused to forward same. When I became aware of
these facts I requested Mr Smith to use his means
in procuring the goods, as it was indispensably necessary,
we should have them soon, and the goods are
now in the way here by express - As my request
Mr Smith has also purchased for us more than
Six hundred dollars worth of boots & shoes, also a
large quantity fish, twenty Bbls Flour &c.

In doing this for us Mr Smith has paid &
advanced upwards of two thousand dollars, which
he needs for other purposes - These purchases
~~which~~ are all paid one - much better by even
10 per cent, than purchases in S^d form

What we want, under these circumstances, is
that you will pay to Mr Smith \$2000,
