UMPI hosts 104th Commencement

hundred nineteen students graduated from the University on May 18, during the 2013 Commencement Exercises - the University's 104th Commencement ceremony. President Linda Schott conferred degrees for the 2012-2013 academic year upon 145 students who participated in

the ceremony held in Wieden Gymnasium.

John Cariani, the accomplished playwright and award-winning actor, addressed the graduates as this year's commencement speaker and was presented with an Honorary Doctor of Humane Letters Degree.

Cariani, who has performed on Broadway, in the movies,

and on the small screen, and hails from Presque Isle, has been a strong proponent of and contributor to the arts throughout his career. His first play, Almost, Maine, is featured in Smith and Kraus' New Playwrights: Best Plays of 2006, has become one of the most frequently produced plays in the United States,

and has been translated into eight languages. His two other plays, Last Gas and LOVE/SICK, premiered at Portland Stage Company and are currently in negotiations for Off Broadway engagements in the coming season.

As an actor, Cariani got his start on Presque Isle stages including one in Wieden continued on page 2

University establishes tobacco-free campus

niversity officials held a press conference on June 3 to officially announce a major effort to provide a healthy and productive work and learning environment for students, employees and visitors—its move to a Tobacco-Free Campus.

UMPI President Linda Schott was joined by members of the University Senate, Student Senate and the campus Health and Wellness Committee in providing details about UMPI becoming tobacco-free, an effort that has been years in the making.

"This is a major step for our University as we join many others in Maine who have reduced harm from

tobacco use and secondhand smoke by establishing a tobacco-free campus," President Linda Schott said. "Our goal is to provide a clean, safe and healthy environment for everyone who comes here, which helps to reduce health care costs and promote wellness and environmental responsibility. In our role as an institution of higher learning, it is important for us to educate and lead on this critical health issue."

Late this spring, UMPI's University Senate cast a historic vote in favor of UMPI becoming a Tobacco-Free Campus. The campus Health and continued on page 4

UMPI, Red Cross to host Super Blood Drive

he American Red Cross and the University's Residence Life Office are teaming up to pull off the University's sixth "Super" Blood Drive

> this summer, the time of year when the need for blood increases.

The Super Blood Drive will be held

from 11:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. on Monday, June 24 in the Gentile Hall Gymnasium. The event is being sponsored by the University and cosponsored by Pat's Pizza, Big Cheese Pizza, Country Farm's Market, and Wal-Mart.

Each year, the UMPI Residence Life Office helps the Red Cross coordinate three blood drives on campus, one in the summer, one in the fall and one in the spring. Since 1987, 4,443 pints of blood have been collected at UMPI. According to the American Red Cross, the need for blood increases during the summer months. The reasons are two-fold: People are more active during the summer and thus are more likely to receive injuries that require blood, and the amount of donations decreases during the summer due to people being busy.

At the June 24 Super Blood Drive, all presenting donors can receive a new American Red Cross T-shirt, a coupon for a FREE day pass to any Maine State Park, and enter a drawing to win a complete family camping package from Eureka and a free week of camping.

Everyone is encouraged to help save

lives at one of the largest American Red Cross blood drives in Aroostook County. Call 1-800-GIVE LIFE [1-800 448.3543] or log onto www.newenglandblood.org and type 04769 in the zip code field to make your appointment today. The goal of the Super Blood Drive is to collect at least 300 pints of life-saving blood.

If you are not interested in donating, but would like to help out, be a volunteer. Volunteers are needed for the following tasks: 9-11:30 a.m. – Set up tables and chairs prior to the blood drive; 11:30 a.m.-5:30 p.m. – Escorting donors to the canteen and working the canteen; 5:30-8 p.m. – Taking down tables and chairs.

Auditorium—and has since performed on Broadway. His performance in the Broadway Revival of *Fiddler on the Roof* earned him an Outer Critics Circle Award and a Tony Award nomination. He's also appeared on the silver screen with film legends Robert De Niro, Christopher Walken, and Ed Asner. Cariani is probably best known, though, for his work on television, where, from 2002 to 2007, he played CSU Tech Julian Beck on NBC's long-running drama, *Law & Order*. He now lives in New York City.

Cariani shared 10 things he hoped for the UMPI Class of 2013, which included a wish that all of their dreams don't come true and that they do not achieve all their goals. Said Cariani, "Don't get me wrong, I want you to become anything and everything that you want to be. I want you all to go out into the world and dream, and make your dreams come true... but I hope that your future is not limited by what you can dream up."

Also during UMPI's commencement exercises, University of Maine System Board of Trustees Vice Chair Samuel W. Collins delivered greetings. Stephen D. Richard, UMPI Board of Visitors Chair, and Keith Madore, UMPI Director of Alumni Relations, offered remarks on behalf of each organization, respectively. Rena Kearney, a member of the University's Class of 1963, was present and recognized on the 50-year milestone of her class.

This year's event served as President Schott's first UMPI Commencement.

"We are so proud of our graduating class and the hard work they have done to get to this special moment," President Schott said. "We have such a wide range of graduates, from traditional students who are looking forward to careers as environmental-

ists, teachers, and law enforcement officials, to our non-traditional students who have successfully balanced home and work as they've strived to make a better life for themselves and their families. UMPI presents Cathie Pelletier reading

he University presented a special evening with award-winning writer Cathie Pelletier on June 3, at 7 P.M. in the UMPI Library, hosting a reading and book signing for her long-anticipated new novel *The One-Way Bridge*.

Pelletier's tenth novel, published by Sourcebooks, returns readers to the logging town of Mattagash, the scene of several of her novels including *The Funeral Makers* and *The Weight of Winter*. The June 3 reading was part of *The One-Way Bridge* national book tour.

Pelletier is no stranger to The County or the University. She hails from Allagash and recently returned to her family homestead to focus on her many writing projects. She also served as UMPI's very first writer-in-residence in 2008. Her novels have been praised as "hilarious, generous and genuine" (New Yorker), "bitingly original" (Vogue), "masterful," (Washington Post), and "funny and unexpectedly moving" (New York Times). She is "absolutely, inherently funny," says the Los Angeles Times, "yet she can walk the tightrope between humor and grief without once losing her balance."

Pelletier began writing *The One-Way Bridge* in 1991 while living in Tennessee. The first draft was finished in Eastman, Quebec, after she moved to Canada in 2005. Twelve drafts and 375 deleted pages later, the final version was completed after she moved back to Allagash.

Pelletier is the author of 10 novels, eight of which are under her own name, beginning with *The Funeral Makers*, published by MacMillan in 1986. Under the pseudonym K. C. McKinnon, she wrote two novels, *Dancing at the Harvest Moon* and *Candles on Bay Street*, both published by Doubleday, the latter earning a million-dollar advance. The first McKinnon novel was translated into 19 languages and was a CBS TV film starring Jacqueline Bisset, Valerie Harper, and Eric Mabius. The second was translat-

ed into 10 languages and was a Hallmark Hall of Fame film starring Alicia Silverstone.

Two of Pelletier's novels under her own name have received notable mentions from the *New York Times Book Review*. Her third novel, *The Weight of Winter*, won the New England Booksellers Award, and her ninth, *Running the Bulls*, won the 2006 Paterson Prize for Fiction.



She adapted her novel A Marriage Made at Woodstock for producer George Stevens, Jr. and Michael Stevens. She also adapted The Funeral Makers for director Doug Liman (Swingers; Bourne Identity; Mr. & Mrs. Smith). Her original screenplay, The Luna Christmas, has been optioned by actor Donald Sutherland.

As if news of a new novel weren't enough to delight Pelletier fans, Sourcebooks has announced that it is putting seven of her previous novels back into new paperback print. The publisher plans to re-launch them in the coming months.

Albanese leads forum on secondary ed reform

n open forum on secondary education reform was held on May 10 in Wieden Gym, providing faculty and staff with an opportunity to discuss ways to best position the University for these changes. The forum featured a presentation by Duke Albanese and Craig Kesselheim, of the Great Schools Partnership, about proficiency-based education.

As required by law, beginning in January 2017, students in Maine will need to earn proficiency-based high school diplomas. This means that the diploma is based on a student's demonstrated proficiency in the eight

content areas identified in Maine statute and included in the Maine Learning Results and the Common Core State Standards.

Albanese, past Maine Education Commissioner and nationally sought-after adviser and speaker on educational issues, explained that proficiency-based learning focuses on multiple measures, with students bearing more responsibility for their learning and teachers providing more opportunities for students to demonstrate it. It also focuses on the idea that students learn differently and at different speeds, allowing students the flexibility to learn in ways that engage

them and giving them choice in how they demonstrate what they've learned.

Following the presentation, President Linda Schott led a discussion about the ways UMPI addresses these issues now, what more it may need to do in the future, and the hopes and concerns members of campus have about such changes. UMPI expects two main impacts—starting in 2017, it will begin admitting students who have acclimated to proficiency-based education, and, even sooner, it will also need to begin preparing its Education majors for teaching in proficiency-based learning environments.

or Jonathan Stormer, heading to medical school this fall isn't just about pursuing his dreams, it's a symbol of his unusual path to a degree and the strong support he received from UMPI faculty and staff members.

Stormer has crammed a lot of work into two and a half years to earn his Bachelor's degree in Biology with a premed concentration. But this effort was more than a decade in the making. Stormer originally earned two Bachelor's degrees from a private college, but when

he returned to school to complete prerequisites toward becoming a chiropractor, he learned that his degrees were from a non-accredited school, meaning no accredited schools would accept his credits.

"That meant I had to start from scratch," Stormer said.

He took a few classes through the Houlton Higher Education Center, and started full-time at UMPI in 2009. Early on, Dr. Bonnie Wood talked with him about becoming a doctor.

"No one in my family went to college, so even thinking about being a doctor was intimidating," Stormer said. "She assured me I was a strong student and that gave me the confidence to do it."

One year in, his first son Atlas was born and diagnosed with Cystic Fibrosis, prompting Stormer and his wife Meredith to relocate near the state's only CF clinic in Portland. Stormer took a year and a half off from his studies.

Returning to school meant an

extremely daunting courseload—and the couple's second son Corban was born in 2012—but Stormer persisted. By coordinating with the Office of Student Records and his professors, Stormer finished his degree by taking a hybrid of live classes at UMPI, online classes, science classes through USM and Orono, and CLEP testing.

Stormer has been accepted to the Campbell University School of Osteopathic Medicine in North Carolina. He plans to complete the four-year program and a three- to seven-year residency. This move also will allow Atlas to have access to one of the top ranked CF clinics in America, located at nearby Duke University. Stormer is quick to point out, though, that things could have gone differently.

"If it wasn't for Kathy Davis, my professors and the way they worked around my schedule and my needs, I wouldn't have been able to make it work," he said. "None of this would have happened without UMPI."


Wellness Committee was tasked with drafting a Tobacco-Free Campus Policy. That policy went into effect on June 1, with an implementation phase taking place between June 1 and Sept. 30 to acclimate the campus and community to the change without penalty.

As laid out in UMPI's Tobacco Free Campus Policy, no employee, student, contractor, vendor, or visitor will be allowed to use any tobacco products on campus. This includes the Houlton Higher Education Center, Skyway Housing Complex, any University owned or leased vehicles, and any privately owned or leased vehicles on University property. This policy applies to all tobacco products and non-FDA approved nicotine products, such as e-cigarettes. To view the policy, please visit www.umpi.edu/tobacco-free.

Several changes will occur as part of this

policy. New signage will be placed around campus—temporary signage has been posted already—all smoking gazebos will be removed, and a variety of resources designed to help individuals become tobacco-free will be promoted. Information will be conveyed to the campus community, incoming students, visitors, and the greater community in a variety of ways—from information tables to door hangers to business card-sized handouts—as the University strives to ensure that everyone is aware of, and observes, the new policy.

During the press conference, held on the first weekday after the policy went into effect, University officials marked the policy's implementation with brief sentiments and a short ceremony that involved the ceremonial decommissioning of the smoking gazebo outside the Campus Center and the planting of a tree to repurpose the spot for oxygen creation.

WAGM's Ted Shapiro offers thunderstrom workshop

he University hosted a Thunderstorm Safety/Spotter Workshop with WAGM Meteorologist Ted Shapiro on May 21. A crowd of about 20 weather enthusiasts attended the free event, an excellent primer as Northern Maine and Western New Brunswick prepares to enter the thunderstorm season.

Shapiro shared important weatherwatching skills everyone should know to help identify impending thunderstorms so they can properly prepare for them. He also taught about clues to look for in the morning, hours before thunderstorms have even developed.

While Northern Maine experiences severe thunderstorms every year, even non-severe thunderstorms can be deadly, so it is critical to know the signs that a storm may be brewing, Shapiro said.

Severe weather can strike unexpectedly and cause fatalities along with serious damage to property. According to U.S. Natural Hazard Statistics compiled by the Office of Climate, Water and Weather Services and the National Climatic Data Center, lightning accounted for about 26 weather fatalities in 2011. While many people think that lightning causes the great-



est loss of life in thunderstorms, it is actually flash flooding during these storms that causes the most fatalities, and, to illustrate that point, Shapiro showed some incredible video of a rapid road washout.

Shapiro was born and raised near Washington, D.C. He has served as Chief Meteorologist at WAGM-TV in Presque Isle since 2006. He also

teaches a field course in weather observation at UMPI.

This workshop was part of the University's StormReady efforts. In 2007, UMPI received a federal designation as a National Weather Service StormReady University, making it the second campus in New England, after Harvard University, and the 21st campus in the nation to receive this designation. Established in 1999, StormReady helps arm communities with the planning, communication and safety skills needed to save lives and property before and during storm events. Program "communities" can include cities, towns, universities, Indian Nations, and government and private entities. Among the requirements that must be met to maintain a StormReady designation is promoting the importance of public readiness through community seminars.

Aging Well Living Well EXPO celebrates seniors

he Aroostook Agency on Aging presented the Aging Well Living Well EXPO at UMPI on June 1. The agency partnered with the United Way of Aroostook, AARP, WAGM-

TV, UMPI, and SAGE (Seniors Achieving Greater Education) on the event, which also served as a celebration of SAGE's 15th anniversary.

The EXPO was especially for people AROOSTOOK nearing or in retirement or interested in improving their health and well-being. The EXPO included informative sessions and event exhibitors sharing products and information to help attendees improve their quality of life and maintain their independence.

Steve Farnham, Aroostook Agency on Aging Executive Director, said organizers wanted the event to serve as a day of learning, exploring opportunities, and enhancing health and well-being for participants.

EXPO booths were open throughout the day in the Exhibitor Hall at Wieden Gymnasium, and workshops were held in Pullen Hall. The day's events included welcoming remarks and a keynote address by Dr. Marilyn Gugliucci, a

Gerontologist from the University of New England Medical School.

Workshops included sessions on a wide variety of topics,

including Social Security and Medicare, Yoga,
Brain Fitness, Ductless Heat Pump
Technology, Avoiding Fraud and Scams,
Outdoor Exploration, Reverse Annuity
Mortgages, Leaving your Legacy,
Traditional Medicines, Medicare Benefits,
Container Gardening, Zumba, and Nutrition.

For the University in particular, this event served as a fitting way to celebrate the 15th anniversary of its Seniors Achieving Greater Education program.

"Our senior college members were excited to be part of this day of promoting healthy options for aging well," Mary Lawrence, SAGE Coordinator, said. "SAGE participants are celebrating 15 years of actively encouraging well-being with our diverse, low stress—no homework or tests—classes and learning excursions, and this EXPO was an excellent way for all of us to continue that celebration."

he 6th annual Young Professionals Institute wrapped up on April 30 in the Campus Center with the usual excellent presentation by participants about what they learned during their eight-week short course. A small difference for this year's YPI participants, however, was the addition of U.S. Senator Angus King as one of the audience members.

YPI is a leadership development short course hosted by UMPI, MMG Insurance and Momentum Aroostook that is designed specifically for emerg-

ing leaders looking to hone their professional skills. This year's Institute focused on the workplace of the future.

While the primary purpose of the UMPI Career & Job Fair is to promote employment opportunities, and facilitate the screening and eventual hiring of qualified employees, an additional benefit for employers is the opportunity to promote their products and services.

Student Support Services awards grant aid

uring a President's Reception held on May 7, 17 students at UMPI received grant awards through the Student Support Services Program. Each full-time-student award was approximately \$800 and will assist the students by reducing their loans.

On December 15, 2000, Section 17 of the Higher Education Act of 1965 was amended to provide grant aid for eligible TRiO Student Support Services Program (SSS) students. The respective college/university SSS Program selects the recipients and awards the grant money to eligible freshman and sophomore college students who are active participants, have successfully completed at least one semester, and are receiving Federal Pell Grants.

This is the twelfth year, since the passing of this act, that the University's SSS Program has been funded to provide its participants with grant aid. A total of \$13,210 was awarded. Mary



Seventeen UMPI students have received Student Support Services Program grant awards. At the New England Board of Higher Education conference The University Unbound: Can Higher Education Compete and Survive the Age of "Free" and Open Learning?, held Oct. 15, 2012, at the Federal Reserve Bank of Boston, he co-presented Open, Flat and Free: Improving Higher Ed and Lowering Its Price with Mary Lou Forward, Executive Director of Open Courseware Consortium and Jeff Shelstad, Co-founder and CEO of Flat World Knowledge. Dr. Rice discusssed UMPI's OpenU program as a "local online open curriculum" and its distinction from its qualitatively different larger siblings, the "MOOCs." ■ On April 5 at the Association of American Colleges and Universities conference Student Success and The Quality Agenda, held in Miami, he copresented a workshop titled Data-driven

Transformative Strategies for Campus-wide Faculty/Staff Collaborations to Enhance Student Success with Carmen R. Cid, Dean of the School of Arts and Sciences at Eastern Connecticut State University; Heather Bouchey, Director of the Patrick and Marcelle Leahy Center for Rural Students at Lyndon State College; and Alicia Doyley, Director of the Academic Achievement Center at Bridgewater State University. Dr. Rice discussed ways that UMPI developed more effective student support services for its underserved student populations through its Project Compass efforts. Most recently, on May 22, Dr. Rice co-presented with UMPI's Dr. Melissa Crowe a webinar for the New England Resource Center for Higher Education's Virtual Think Tank Series. Titled The LOOC (Local Open Online Course): Full Access to Free Online Courses, the two discussed UMPI's process toward developing its "LOOCs"; the politics of scalability, asynchronicity vs. connectivity, and massive delivery capacity vs. local engagement; and how the MOOC movement could be repurposed to engage and promote the best values of a liberal education while serving as a tool for institutions of all sizes to better serve their community. *
